# Course Title: Choral Ensemble: The Roots Project

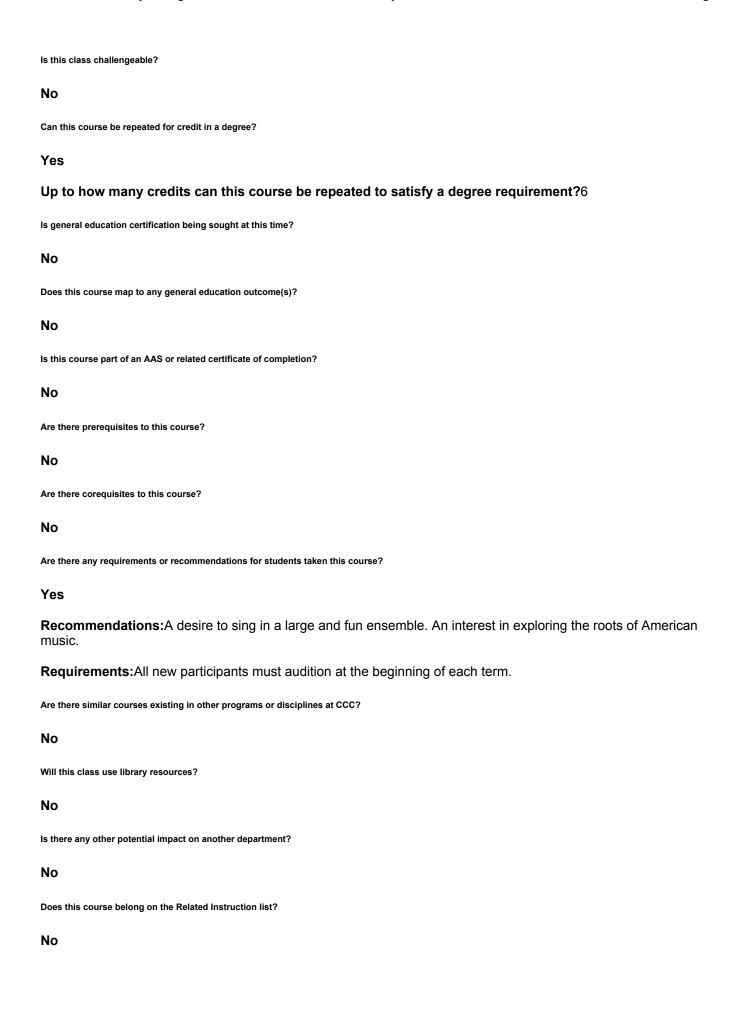
### Course Description:
