

- 11. use the Spanish word hay plus indefinite articles, where needed, to identify what is in the classroom and his/her room at home:
- 12. correctly use Spanish numbers to express telephone numbers,
- 13. correctly choose "estar" or "ser" to discuss current states of mind and body, personal characteristics, place of origin, nationality, and time;
- 14. correctly use the verb "tener" to discuss obligations plus certain states of mind and body,
- 15. use correct word order and guestion words to ask questions relating to the topics listed in the Major Topic outline,
- 16. correctly use regular ar, er, and ir verbs to make simple statements and questions about the topics mentioned in the Major Topic Outline;
- 17. describe cultural differences between the US and Spanish-speaking countries with regard to each of the topics mentioned in the Major Topic Outline.

# Section #2 Course Transferability

Concern over students taking many courses that do not have a high transfer value has led to increasing attention to the transferability of LDC courses. The state currently requires us to certify that at least one OUS school will accept a new LDC course in transfer. Faculty should communicate with colleagues at one or more OUS schools to ascertain how the course will transfer by answering these questions.

- 1. Is there an equivalent lower division course at the University?
- 2. Will a department accept the course for its major or minor requirements?
- 3. Will the course be accepted as part of the University's distribution requirements?

If a course transfers as an elective only, it may still be accepted or approved as an LDC course, depending on the nature of the course, though it will likely not be eligible for Gen Ed status.
