- 6. make comparisons of superiority, inferiority, equality, and superlativity;
- 7. relate what they did at previous times using the preterit tense combined with expressions referring to the past,
- 8. describe the order of events and things using ordinal numbers,
- 9. use hace que plus the preterit tense to describe how long ago events took place,
- 10. use passive and impersonal constructions to describe actions and events without mentioning the causal agent,
- 11. describe on-going past circumstances and events using the imperfect tense,
- 12. demonstrate a polite way to get a stranger's attention in public,
- 12. demonstrate telephone etiquette using fixed Spanish expressions,
- 13. use the verb ir in the imperfect tense to describe past intentions,
- 14. demonstrate correct use of indefinite and negative expressions.
