



This trend demonstrates a strong and sustained demand for skilled professionals in this area, justifying the need for targeted training programs.

Specifically, the Labor Market Need for Medical Assistants highlights this demand further.

Medical Assistant is identified as a high-demand career with a projected 24% growth rate.

Currently, Oregon has 1,942 job openings, including 886 in the Tri-county area, with a projected overall growth of 25% over the next ten years. Additionally, the compensation for this occupation is competitive, offering an average hourly rate of \$24.47 or an annual salary of \$50,907 (source: QualifyInfo.org).

By offering relevant training, the community college plays a critical role in equipping students with the skills needed to meet workforce needs and contribute to the state's economic growth.

This alignment between program offerings and labor market demands serves as clear evidence of the program's value and necessity.

The community college demonstrates a clear commitment to systemic methods for meaningful and ongoing involvement of appropriate stakeholders through its MA Program Advisory Board and strategic collaborations. The Advisory Board includes key college departments such as Adult Skills/GED, ESOL, Workforce Development, and High School Partnerships, as well as representatives from prominent employers like Legacy Medical Group, Providence Medical Group, OHSU, Kaiser, and NW Primary Care. This diverse representation ensures that the curriculum and assessments are aligned with current industry needs and are both relevant and applicable.

Additionally, the program's collaboration with the Clackamas Free Clinic and CVIM to provide students with clinical experience highlights the institution's dedication to fostering real-world, practical training. These partnerships create opportunities for students to gain hands-on experience, ensuring they are well-prepared for their future careers while simultaneously addressing community health needs.

This comprehensive approach reflects the college's systemic efforts to engage relevant stakeholders in a meaningful and ongoing manner, strengthening its programs and their impact on the community.

Standard C: Alignment - The program is aligned with appropriate education, workforce development, and economic development activities.

The Medical Assistant (MA) program demonstrates robust alignment with key education, workforce development, and economic development priorities. populations. By prioritizing communities of color, low-income individuals, and veterans, the

for those who have historically faced barriers. This inclusive approach aligns with broader

economic development goals by fostering a skilled and diverse workforce that contributes to
the growth and resilience of local economies.

The MA Program is meticulously designed to ensure that students achieve the academic and technical knowledge, skills, and related proficiencies required for success as entry-level Medical Assistants. Guided by the latest best practices in student-centered learning and transparency, the program incorporates authentic instruction and assessment, problem- and project-based learning, mentoring, and the development of critical thinking skills. These approaches cater to diverse teaching and learning styles, creating a rich and supportive educational environment.

The program's learning outcomes are clearly defined and aligned with CAAHEP accreditation standards and the Medical Assistant Education Review Board (MAERB) competencies. This alignment ensures that students gain not only foundational cognitive knowledge—such as anatomy, physiology, medical terminology, equipment handling, and safety—but also the essential hands-on skills necessary for clinical practice. The hybrid and online course formats provide flexibility for working adults and students with competing priorities, allowing them to balance their studies with other responsibilities.

Additionally, the program places a strong emphasis on soft skills—critical attributes for employability in the healthcare field. By integrating these competencies into the curriculum, graduates are well-prepared to excel in their roles. Upon successful completion of the program, students are eligible for industry-recognized credentials, including the CMA(AAMA), RMA(AMT), CCMA(NHA), or NCMA(NCCT). This comprehensive approach ensures that graduates are equipped with the knowledge, skills, and professional attributes needed to thrive in their careers as Medical Assistants.

Standard E: Capacity - The community college identifies and has the resources to develop, implement, and sustain the program.

The MA program at CCC has a strong history of sustainability, demonstrating the institution's commitment to providing quality education and maintaining the program over time. With well-established resources and infrastructure, CCC has consistently supported the program's development and success.

Current staffing includes one full-time faculty member who serves as both the Program

Director and Clinical Coordinator, ensuring leadership and continuity. Additionally, the program

benefits from the expertise of two part-time faculty members and a dedicated lab assistant,

collectively providing comprehensive academic and practical training for students. This staffing

model, along with the program's proven track record, confirms that CCC is equipped to

develop, implement, and sustain the MA program effectively.

This course is being developed through a grant and is being piloted in PPS and PSU. There has been a change in high school pathways to a 2+1 model of math courses with a greater emphasis on data reasoning in the first two years of high school and the expanding of data driven courses in the third year of math for students. One of these pathways focuses on data science and statistics. While a Statistics course can be used for this option, the field of Statistics does not put as much emphasis on being a consumer of data in the real world. Additionally, students do not often learn robust computing language skills to perform data analysis. An exploratory data science course has the goal of increasing real world data literacy while also teaching students some basics of statistical computing language (ex. R or Python).
