Key Elements of the New Accreditation Standards

Examines the institution's interpretation and translation of its mission into practice Provides for continuous evaluation of the extent to which it achieves that mission Focuses on analysis and synthesis and a holistic view of the institution Integrates planning, action and assessment in shorter reporting intervals

Standard 1- Mission, Core Themes, and Expectations

The institution articulates its purpose in the form of a mission statement and identifies core themes that manifest essential elements of that mission. It defines mission fulfillment in the context of its purpose, characteristics, and expectations. Guided by that definition it identifies an acceptable threshold or extent of mission fulfillment.

Standard 2- Resources and Capacity

In its major functions, resources, and infrastructure, the institution exhibits the potential to fulfill its mission, accomplish its core theme objectives, and achieve the goals or intended outcomes of its programs and services, wherever offered and however delivered.

Standard 3- Planning and Implementation

Institutional planning provides direction for the institution and leads to fulfillment of its mission, accomplishment of its core theme objectives, and achievement of the identified goals or intended outcomes of its programs and services.

Standard 4- Effectiveness and Improvement

The institution regularly and systematically analyzes data and forms evidence-based judgments of achievement of core theme objectives and achievement of goals or outcomes of programs and services. It uses assessment results to effect improvement and disseminates its findings to its constituencies. Standard 5- Mission Fulfillment, Adaptation, and Sustainability

The institution evaluates fulfillment of its mission in light of the institution's core themes and own expectations (see Standard One). The institution monitors its environment and forecasts and adapts to patterns, trends, and circumstances that may influence institutional viability and sustainability.

Standard 1- Mission Fulfillment and Core Themes

The institution identifies core themes that individually manifest essential elements of its mission and collectively encompass its mission.

For each core theme the institution establishes objectives, each with meaningful, assessable, and verifiable indicators of achievement, which form the basis for evaluating achievement of those objectives.

Core Themes-NWCCU Definition

a manifestation of a fundamental aspect of institutional mission with an overarching common purpose that guides planning for programs and services, development of capacity, and application of resources to fulfill that aspect of the mission
