Approval of Minutes – Phillip King

Minutes from the meeting on April 15, 2016 were previously sent out for review. Any changes, please send to Tami.

ARC: Student Email Use Policy - First Read - Tara Sprehe

ARC is breaking out the policy from the process. There is a new format that both ISP and ARC are using. This is the first read of this so it will come back to College Council for a second read.

There is the procedure and then two different processes: one for employees and one for students. For employees:

- Lists who is authorized to approve emails to all students. Are they listed in any particular order?
 No.
- More subheadings in #2. Breakout of group messages. Pull together a small group to go over.
- Are announcements about Moodle an appropriate use since students are enrolled in online classes?
- We use email as a communication tool.
- 3rd bullet under #2, Classroom email add: Instructor can decide to use a student's personal email or their CCC email.
- Dion reports that we don't have a secure server.
- Amanda volunteers Faculty Senate to look over process. Tara will let her know as ARC will need to go back and look at the process.

For students:

- Under #1, 5th paragraph, change reactive to reactivate.
- You can forward your CCC email to your personal email account. Daisy has instructions on how to do so. Jill will get those to Tara.

Accreditation: David Plotkin

The exit meeting was on Wednesday. The accreditation team shared their recommendations and commendations. Kudos to all.

The team will be sending us the report. Based on the read out, won't guarantee anything but thinks it's highly likely we did well.

Next steps. We will receive a draft of the teams report and respond with factual corrections. Then it goes to the commission. We meet with them for about an hour. Then they make a recommendation.

Recommendations:

Based on a compilation of people taking notes, David will send out the information to all.

- #1. Adopt a comprehensive board policy on academic freedom and responsibility. We have a board policy on academic freedom in the FT/PT faculty contracts. Maybe board policy not extensive enough. Need to talk about not just freedom but responsibility.
- #2. SLO's: Specifically related AAS and certificate that have related instruction not programs smaller than that.
- #3. Fully integrate student assessment from SLO's across all levels. What that means for us isn't clear. One issue for core themes may need more direct evidence. It's something we continue to work on. Evaluator said something in each case good that you have interim measures but you also need to have summative measure that you hold to the end of the program.
- #4. Integrate core theme planning with other planning. Difficulty understanding how our core themes operated with our strategic planning.
- #5. Should create core theme indicators that are meaningful. Pushing meaningful indicators of success like employment, completion, retention, etc... There is ongoing pressure to make the institution more accountable.

The exhibit room showed how much pride we take in the institution.

Core theme planning – substantively looks like we have a lot of planning so don't add anything else just combine.

We exhibit a high level of collaboration with community – CWE, CT, Companies, and OEP.

Engaging in strong shared governance and collaboration across groups. How clearly everyone they talked to was focused on student success. Creating an environment that is congenial across groups.

Bill Waters: The bar is constantly getting raised and moved. Things are evolving. The accreditation team is looking at us and comparing that to where they want us to now be. We are all doing a really good job. Bar is up and over now. Next one in 7 years. We wouldn't want to stay stagnant. We want to keep growing. Bar is moving for them as well as for us.

<u>Integrating Planning & Budgeting – David Plotkin/Bill Waters</u>

Wednesday is the first budget committee meeting. Every time he sees Jim's presentation, it keeps getting better. We need to start integrating budget and planning.

- 1. Simplify: our planning is not non-existent. We have lots of planning. Want to whittle it down so it's more manageable. Revise blueprints so they are more user friendly.
- 2. Alignment: when areas are planning goals and action there needs to be a clear line from area to the strategic priority. Being aligned and encouraging creativity.
- 3. Continue our processes of inclusive flow. The World café model was example of how this institution communicates.
- 4. Integration of syncing up budget with planning. Decisions about money have to be driven by a strategy. Have to use strategic planning to guide us. CAP is a playbook to guide people on Department Planning Templates.
