Renda Topic	Facilitator	Meeting Minutes
Announcement	Tim Cook	President Cook shared information about the Oregon City campus closure today. Through social media the College discovered a group(s) planning to rally for a political demonstration. After unsuccessful attempts to reach organizers regarding policies for such events, and due to safety concerns, the College was advised to close campus. The entrances to the college are gated and monitored by College Safety and local law enforcement. Tri-Met access continues without disruption.
Chatbot – Proof of Concept (Innovation Fund)	Saby Waraich	Saby shared a PowerPoint about a proof of concept project. He is applying for college innovation funds to implement a chatbot in the ITS department – IA software that can simulate conversation via text, text-to-speech. Examples, Alexa, Siri, Google.
		Chatbots save costs, increases customer satisfaction, cut down on response time to customers, provide accessibility and reduce barriers. They can be designed to provide information, answer frequently asked questions, and complete common tasks that are normally assigned to employees.
		Plan is to pilot the project with the Service Desk ticketing system. If funded and project is successful, results and recommendations for possible integration in other areas will be shared at College Council.
		Questions and Comments
		 Q: Are there security or privacy concerns? A: Software secure to use with our existing systems and FERPA compliant. Q: Will chatbots work with our existing website? A: Yes. Comment: concerned with the AI replacing human interaction and possibly jobs. Response: a chatbot won't replace human interaction, it will assist with common information and tasks, freeing up much needed time for more meaningful work. Customers can opt to speak to a person during hours of operation. Q: What is the cost? A: Approximately \$50,000/year.

Chatbot – Proof of Concept (Continued)	Saby Waraich	 Q: Are other colleges using chatbots? A: Yes, many schools use chatbots and products interact with Ellucian. Q: Where will chatbots be used? A: This proof of concept is the ITS Service Desk system. Q: How is it programmed to answer questions? A: Chatbots look at our data to learn, Knowledge Base in this instance. It takes about 3-4 months to be optimal as it learns from customer questions, needs, etc. Q: Is it multi-lingual? A: Yes. Q: Is there information about rate of error when accessing student data? A: None at this time. The funding is to try chatbots for internal communication. If interested for students, a research project would be launched to provide information to the College. Q: When will internal testing begin for this? A: If the project moves forward a timeline will be shared with the college prior to implementation. Assessment Committee Annual Report Elizabeth Carney		Elizabeth shared a PowerPoint about the committee mission, membership, work completed, and goals for future. This is a faculty led committee, academic assessment is at program and college level. Committee assessed program reviews, accreditation reporting, and conducted a faculty survey on assessment work. Barriers were high due to the pandemic, adapting to online instruction, and limited assessment material and data. Plans for future include DEI training and a closer study of how program assessment relates to program review and how the committee can best support programs.	

Campus Use & Development Committee (CUDC) Annual Report	Bob Cochran	 Bob shared a PowerPoint about the committee mission, membership, work completed, and goals for future. The committee and subcommittees provide direction for maintenance, modification, construction, and use of existing and proposed college buildings, facilities, and grounds. Work this year included: Renovations, adjacency work, signage throughout the college, including monument signage at all campus entries. Food Service subcommittee on pause due to the pandemic. Working to maintain inventory of trees on campus for college courses. OSHA building safety inspections on hold due to the pandemic. Working on signage for environmental health and safety guidelines related to the pandemic.
